While the term Girl power was made popular by the Spice Girls in the nineties it has been the motivating factor for male athletes to lift their game at Tuesday night MAWA meetings at the WA Athletics Stadium.

First track sensation Wendy Seegers hit the scene. She has been the talk of the sprint runners with some super-fast times, only a few months after her return to competition.

Wendy had an impressive career running for South Africa some years ago competing at the IAAF World Championships at Seville and the World Indoor Championships at Maebashi, Japan in 1999.

Now it was the turn of the male distance runners to be put on notice when Lauren Shelley entered a 3000m at WAAS.

Lauren represented Australia at the 2005 World Half Marathon Championships in Edmonton and picked up another win in the Perth City to Surf this year.

Eyeing another start in the prestigious Zatopek 10,000m in Melbourne this month Lauren was preparing to do a training session when she decided to run the 3000m. She went on to win the race in 10 mins 32 secs with Roscoe McDonnell second in 10:45.4.

Lauren's training the previous week consisted of 22 x 400s, only two reps short of her initial goal.

She is known to a number of MAWA members in her role as a physiotherapist at Body Logic at Bethesda Hospital. Lauren's understanding of the needs of an injured athlete were highlighted when she assisted Margaret Saunders and Peggy Macliver's rehabilitation from injuries prior to the World Masters at Sacramento in July.

Born in Yugoslavia in 1961, Rudy Kocis came to Australia aged three and grew up mainly in Sydney and Adelaide. Sport was in his genes (though none of his three sons has inherited the running bug) and he started running when he was about six. He loved competing and won many races as a junior, usually finishing in the top four in state championships. He joined the Navy at eighteen and although you "can't sprint too far on a ship" he represented the Navy several times in the Forces games. He also played soccer at a reasonably high amateur level for about forty years until his "knees gave in" and couldn't cope with all the twisting and turning.

After ten years in the Navy, he worked in Perth for six years before moving to Northam, where he has been for the last seventeen years. He runs a business, Country Copiers, and was Avon Valley Business Person of the Year in 2010.

It was his marriage breakup that kick-started his running again. He needed to refocus and concentrate his energy on something constructive. And maybe it had something to do with his recurring dream about buying colourful sprint spikes! He joined MAWA in 2010 and found that "after such a long absence, the pain of getting back to competitive running, let alone sprinting, was pretty hard going". But with support from fellow athletes he has grown in confidence and is looking forward to regaining strength and speed commensurate with his age and ability.

In the 3000m there were no less than 32 entrants requiring two heats. Sub 13minutes was organiser **Barrrie Kernaghan's** discriminator for the first heat. The race was of such a high quality that twelve of the fourteen set new best times of one form or another, an amazing race. There were four PBAs (Mark Dawson again, Terry Cummins, David

Brook, and Grant Schofield), five new club tops for 2011/12 (M40 Andrew Brooker, M30 Grahak Cunningham, M50 Roscoe McDonnell, M55 Alan Gower and M60 Graeme Dahl). Three others set season's bests.

Heat 2 could have been an anti-climax – it was anything but. **Karyn Gower** and **John Oldfield** led from the gun, with Karyn setting the pace for five laps. As she began to tire, John took over, with Karyn fighting back gamely to make it a good finish, John claiming a new CT. However, behind these two was the real star of the evening. **Gillian Young** holds the W60 state record, set four years ago when she was new to the age group. Her time, now she is at the top end of the age group was only 10 seconds slower, but garnered her an astonishing points total of 91%-plus. 90% is considered world-class.

Gillian's daughter **Mel Hynds** set a new PBA, breaking the 14-minute mark for the first time. **Carol Bowman** and **Julie Wilson** had a terrific *battle of the W55s*, with Carol (SB) just edging out Julie (PBA). **Peggy Macliver** started her campaign to retain the trophy with a new CT of 14:36.4, and **Bob Schickert** also went to the top of the Club Tops list for his new age group of M70.

Most of those there were aiming at the PT long jump, with soggy sand and a waterlogged runway to welcome them. Top points went to **Peggy Macliver**, whose trophy defence is developing pace. Her 74% was well clear of **Delia Baldock's** 62% and a clutch of competitors in the mid-50s. Longest jump of the evening belonged to **Kim Thomas** with 4.67m. Grateful thanks, as ever, are due to **Les Beckham**. Les' tireless service to the club is often taken for granted.

WAAS – November 8

Despite inclement weather, there were good numbers on the night. It seems that the Patron's Trophy has regained some of its allure that had perhaps been fading a little in recent years. Certainly **Les Beckham** may have been surprised by the numbers as he battled in his usual game style to make the long jump as smooth as possible in these difficult conditions. He really is a treasure! No less than 17 took advantage of his organisational skills.

Dave Wyatt (77%) took percentage honours, with **Chris Neale** (5.59m) recording the longest jump. However, perhaps the most significant marks were **Gillian Young's** 54% and **Campbell Till's** 66%. **Gillian** is the current leader in the women's event, whilst **Campbell** (2009 trophy winner) has had a delayed start to his campaign through a virus.

Twenty competitors took to the track in the Patron's Trophy 400m, requiring four heats. This is one of **David Carr's** speciality events. It is no surprise that he strengthened his grip on the leader-board with an 89.8% run. **Gillian Young**, current women's leader, produced a gallant 79% to cement her challenge to the rest of the women. **Carol Bowman**, **Delia Baldock** and **Bob Schickert** (75% each) did their cause no harm. With a rock concert at WA Athletics Stadium disrupting the programme in two week's time, Patron's Trophy contestants faced a double challenge with the 5000m added to the scheduled 400m on the night. With the majority of athletes doing both events five heats were required for the 400m to start the programme.

Some major moves were made in the trophy leader-board. The 400m saw **Graeme Dahl** (76.7%), **Andrew Brooker** (80.3%) and **Campbell Till** (85.6%) lay down solid foundations for a move up the table. Amongst the women **Peggy Macliver** (83.5%) is making up the ground on front-runner **Gillian Young**. In a stand-

out series of races, several who are not aiming to complete ten trophy events also scored highly. **Chris Neale** (81%) won the top heat, with **Duncan McAuley**, **Barrie Kernaghan** and **Mark Elms** also either over or just under the 80% mark.

The gauntlet was picked up in the 5000m as Mark Dawson, Grant Schofield, Maurice Creagh and Julie Wilson all recorded PBAs. Two other contenders for minor trophy placings are Karyn Gower and John Oldfield. They repeated the ding-dong battle they had in the 3000m two weeks ago, but this time Karyn won the sprint finish. Her 78% was the top score in this event, with John's 77.9 only just behind. Terry Cummins won the race in 18:55, with Kim Thomas, another strong trophy contender in second place.

Peggy Macliver, Gillian Young and Lynne Schickert all scored well amongst the women. Greg Wilson and David Carr were the pick of the male entrants, with Campbell Till and Nick Miletic moving up the leader-board with reasonable points.

The conclusion to the meeting saw no less than six heats of 100m. Women's trophy holder **Peggy Macliver** finished just shy of 90% in 16.4s. Men's holder **David Carr** does not seem to mind what event it is, he always scores heavily, but this was one of the few track occasions he was under 80%. Following a delayed start to

WA Athletics Stadium was designed for sprinters with a fast track and the prevailing wind a tailwind in the home straight. This week the trophy event was the 100m so inevitably the night was all about sprints.

Highlight of the round was sprint queen **Peggy Macliver** with 90.8%, closely followed by **Campbell Till**, **Dave Wyatt**, **Keith Martin** and **Andrew Brooker**. All these scored mid to high 80s.

In the first heat Andrew headed Campbell across the line, but Campbell took the age graded honours with a higher percentage. Barrie Kernaghan's 14.2 in the second heat gained him the male age graded honours for the night with 88.52% Roscoe McDonnell ran an impressive 14.4 (77.71%) following a hard 3000m (10.45) in the event before the 100m.

The final heat saw the funny side of sprinting, with **John Oldfield** almost falling over in his attempt to get moving, and wife **Christine** 'marking time' so that he could beat her (or so she said). In this heat Julie Wilson strengthened her position as she topped the age graded honours with 71.02%.

Patron's Trophy combatants had the opportunity to improve their standings on the leaderboard with two trophy events on the programme at Ern Clark Athletic Centre (Coker Park).

Early action centred on the triple jump which saw **Peggy Macliver** reclaim the lead in the womens' standings with a very high jumps mark of 77%. Her integrity also came to the fore as she had pointed out an error in an earlier jump, one metre too much being recorded.

Other outstanding jumps came from Keith Martin (72%), Delia Baldock (70%) and an 11.61m jump by Chris

Neale. Lynne Schickert and Sarah Ladwig also notched good points.

It was not a good night weather-wise for distance running, but there were still some excellent performances. The still, humid warmth made life difficult, but **Gillian Young** made light of it with an 88% run, three points more than her rival **Peggy Macliver.** Men's leader **David Carr** also scored highly (85%). Of the non-trophy runners, **Boris Padovan** was again in a class of his own, more than a lap ahead of his nearest rival. PBAs went to **Maurice Creagh, John Dennehy** and **Monique Thomas.**



WAAS – November 1

A stunning evening of athletics was enjoyed by a new record turnout for WAAS Tuesday meets of 42 athletes. There were memorable moments in each of the six events. It is fitting that the two highlights were shared between field and track. **Dave Wyatt's** new M60 state record in the high jump of 1.45m happened just before the track highlight in heat two of the 3000m. But **Gillian Young** was not to be denied her moment of glory as she then raced to an astonishing 91.09% in this final event of the evening, clocking a time of 13:05.8.

Two heats of the 100m challenged the four timekeepers. Wendy Seegers and Bernard Riviere have certainly added to the quality of our sprint races. Wendy (12.6) had the better of Bernard (12.8) into a headwind in heat one. Barrie Kernaghan easily won heat two ahead of fast finishing Keith Martin, with John Dennehy running an SB in third place.

Meanwhile, in the triple jump **Melissa Foster** hopped, stepped and jumped to just under 10m **Peggy Macliver** recording 6.90m for a season's best.

A busy track was cleared for us so that the seven protagonists in the two-lap event could have a clear run. It was a high class field, with each of the first four runners clocking personal landmarks. **Grahak Cunningham** and **Mark Dawson** had a close battle throughout, with Grahak's PBA (2:30.3) helping Mark to a time of 2:31.3 – over 15 seconds better than his previous best M50 time. **John Collier** was pleased to run his best of the season in third, with M65 **Maurice Creagh** running 3:00.3 – a new PBA. **Val Prescott** was another welcome returnee.

Wth two heats of 200m. Wendy Seegers edged out Andrew Taylor, with Bernard Riviere in third place. A





club top went to Wendy, with Andrew being towed through to his PBA. Heat 2 saw another returnee, **Duncan McAuley** win with yet another Club Top. **Keith Martin** was close behind, setting a new season's best.

ECAC – November 3

Heavy rain in the late afternoon resulted in a low turnout at Ern Clark Athletics Centre (Coker Park) with the majority of athletes in the Patron's Trophy long jump.

Throws were again disrupted by the ongoing repair of the hammer/discus cage. Once the cage is back in action the hammer and discus events for the Trophy will be re-scheduled. **Damien Hanson** still keeps smiling, whatever fate seems to put in the way of meaningful throws competition.

It was not sprinting weather, but some good races did ensue in both the 60m and 100m events. A number of new club tops were set, with **Rod Hamilton** also clocking a PBA in the longer sprint.

Perhaps the highlight on the track was a high quality 1500m. Rod Hamilton and Kim Thomas led the way for the first 1000m, but Rod changed gear towards the end and won the race convincingly in another PBA. He is in fine form at the moment, whereas perhaps Kim needs another few weeks to get back to his best. Behind these two, Graeme Dahl had a fine race with his best of recent times, and Maurice Creagh continues to edge towards the form we saw from him a couple of years back. Lynne Schickert produced an excellent time walking this distance. This is her target race since turning 70.

The evening concluded with a 4000m event, won by **Roscoe McDonnell** from **Rod Hamilton**, the rest of the field stretched out over many laps behind.

Analysis of the results

WAAS – November 4

Conditions were pleasant for the opening night of the 2011/12 Strive season at WAAS. Masters' focus, all male, was evenly split between track and field.

There was no doubt about the highlight. **Scott Tamblin** returned to the track with a storming run in the 3000m, clocking 8:49.0 to set a new M30 state record. One feels there is much more to come, both in this and the shorter 800m later in the season. **Xander van Rijen** was another star as he started with a 2:02.45 season-opener in the 800m to record a new PBA.


Sprinters **Paul Jeffery** and **Barrie Kernaghan** were pleased with their runs too. **Paul** took advantage of the benign conditions to set a new PBA in the 200m, whilst **Barrie** ran season's best in both short and long sprints.

Three throws events kept athletes and officials on their toes for this busy evening's athletics. Six MAWA men rotated around the infield, both literally and figuratively as they moved between shot, javelin and discus sites. The evening opener was the shot put. **Matt Staunton** top-scored with a put of 11.65m, a distance he recorded three times. **Tom Gravestock** and **Craig van Waardenburg** each put to almost 11m, but the biggest smile of the evening lit up the face of **Paul Foley** as he threw a new lifetime PB of 10.17m with the last trial of the competition, heaving the full-size 7.26kg shot.

We welcomed new member **Martin Brough** to the fold in the javelin with a throw of over 33m. **Paul Foley** and **Matt Staunton** threw either side of 40m.

Then it was over to the discus cage to close the evening. Top throws this time went to **Matt Staunton** and **Paul Jeffery**. Matt's was over 39m, with Paul's mark of 37.49m a new PBA by around 2.5m. **Tom Gravestock** and **Paul Foley** finished with good throws too.





WAAS – November 8

There was a real horde clamouring to take advantage of the following wind in the sprint events. Four heats of the 60m were called for. The *fast* heat of four class athletes produced three PBAs and a season's best, but of course are all designated *wind-assisted*. **Bernie Riviere**, one of the nicest blokes you could wish to meet, took the honours, dragging **Chris Neale, Wendy Seegers** and **Craig van Waardenburg** through in a fantastic race.

The next two heats matched the first for closeness of finish, if not times. Potential new member **Suzanne Coate** brought her daughter with her to pace her through to a swift 9.6s in the third heat, with **Delia Baldock** and **John Dennehy** a whisker behind, inseparable for the timekeepers. Prior to that another potential member **Quinton de Klerk** recorded 7.9, dragging through a metre back **Campbell Till**, now thankfully over the virus that has kept him out for a couple of weeks. **Paul Foley**, better known as a very competent thrower, but also no mean sprinter, paced the young visitors through in the final heat.

It was a similar story in the 100m dash. A fantastic first heat (**Chris Neale** 12.1, **Bernie Riviere** 12.2, then **Wendy Seegers** and **Craig van Waardenburg**) had good quality follow-up heats. Sandwiched in between the sprints was a 1500m where athletes were battling drizzle before the storm and a very wet, in places waterlogged, track. Notable in this was a husband and wife re-writing of the current club tops. **Alan Gower** (5:16) followed another potential new member **Mike Kowal**, with Alan's wife **Karyn** adding a second Gower CT to the books with 6:05. Between these was **Maurice Creagh** agonisingly close to 6 minutes for the 1500m – another PBA.

We closed the evening with a torrential storm, It curtailed the high jump with some still in their prime (**Dave Wyatt** has already equalled his SR but was deprived of the opportunity to try to raise it)

Analysis of the results

ECAC – November 10

Prior to the Patron's Trophy events there had been two sprint events. **Jimmy Thommana**, **Colin Smith** and **Mel Hynds** were the three heat winners in the 200m, with **Kim Thomas** and new member **Simon Popelier** taking honours in the 60m dash. **Rod Hamilton**, predominantly a distance runner, again showed his all-round ability with a PBA over 200m.


Although **Rod Hamilton** (19:38) crossed the line first in the 5000m, he will forgive me for saying that the real story was four places behind him. **Sue Bourn** is relatively new to MAWA but is always there or thereabouts in the distance field on Thursday evenings. More often than not she is the women's leader. Her 21:06.5 was one-tenth of a second from a lifetime PB, set in her first season with us last year.

Maurice Creagh continued his resurgence with his second PBA of the evening, in successive races! A number of the 400m competitors used this final event as a warm down, some opting for the shorter 3000m, others continuing to the full distance.

There was also a good turnout for the throws. With the cage out of action, these are restricted to only three events. The two were shot and javelin. **Matt Staunton** led the shot field with a season's best 11.83m, **Geoff Gee** (11.75m) only just behind him. **Andrew Ward** set a new PBA, putting over 8m for the first time.

New member **Roger Ditewig** is a throws and jumps specialist, rejecting strongly any suggestion that MAWA might turn him into a runner as well. His 39.23m javelin throw was the night's lead, almost 5m longer than the next best throw.





WAAS – November 15


It was an even busier evening than usual with two Patron's Trophy events at WAAS. With disruption to the programme in two weeks' time, the 5000m was designated a trophy event in addition to the 400m. Sandwiched between these were three heats of 60m and four 200m races. Add triple and high jumps with ten and twelve competitors and you will get the flavour of the evening's attraction.

A good tailwind again meant that sprint times were wind assisted. It showed too, as **Bernie Riviere**, **Wendy Seegers** and **Andrew Brooker** each recorded PBAs in the first heat of the 60m. There were season's bests almost all the way down the card in the longer sprint (200m). **Andrew Brooker** recorded another PBA following home the winner **Chris Neale** in the top heat, and just edging out fast finishing **Mark Elms**. **Roscoe McDonnell** took the second heat.

A busy evening in the field saw five members and five visitors triple jumping. **Chris Neale** (11.05m) and **Bernie Riviere** (10.37m) showed how it should be done in a high-class competition. Twelve entrants kept organiser **Dave Wyatt** busy in the vertical jump tonight. New member **Roger Ditewig** had the highest jump of 1.55m. His daughter **Taryn** showed that she can jump as well, with a 1.40m HJ and 9.50m triple.

Last week I gave a well-deserved mention to Les Beckham for his efforts on behalf of the club. We must also give grateful appreciation to the work done by Barrie Kernaghan. This is the second year that Barrie has been running Tuesday evenings for us. It is now a more demanding task as we share the stadium with so many others.

Analysis of the results



ECAC – November 17

Despite the focus on the Patron's trophy events of shot put and 100m sprints interest was high in the support events at Ern Clark Athletics Centre.

Simultaneous with the shot put were the first three track events. Three heats of 60m dash were over in an eye-blink, winners **Kim Thomas, Simon Popelier** and **John Dennehy** happy with their evening's opener. **Kim** also led the 800m runners home ahead of **Campbell Till** and **Rod Hamilton** (another PBA).

In the distance event **Rod Hamilton** continued his excellent form of late to win the 3000m in 11:10. PBAs were pocketed by **Kim Cook** and **Monique Thomas**, with **Robin King** the lone walker over the distance.

WAAS – November 18

Roscoe McDonnell was either brave or foolish. An occasional competitor against the best in the state at these Strive meets, he decided to enter three races – 400m, 1500m and 3000m steeplechase. Although taken aback by his 400m seeding which meant he ran the final 400m heat, then jogged straight to the start of the steeple! As it turned out it was brave, rather than foolish – a PBA in both the 400m and 1500m, followed by a good time in over the barriers meant he went home tired, but happy.

Wendy Seegers also tested herself at Strive for the first time, producing a swift 12.75 in the 100m top heat. Brett Blanco, almost an M40 now, clocked 12.18 in the men's top heat, with Mark Elms also under 13s in a later heat. Mark backed this up with a sub-60 400m, with Roscoe and Barrie Kernaghan clocking quick ones as well. Roscoe was surprised when told he had to use blocks for this race. Some tuition from Barrie put him right!

There was good MAWA representation in the three throws. More than half of the hammer field was wearing the singlet, with **Byrony Glass** having her first outing of the season. 45m is well below her best, but it flexed a few muscles as she got her season under way. **Matt Staunton's** 42.69m was the next best in his final outing as a single man. As I write this, his flight is on the way to Hawaii with his bride-to-be. It's the honeymoon there and LA, then on to Vegas to be wed.

WAAS – November 22

It was really all about the two sprints on this Tuesday night. WAAS was designed for sprinters with a fast track and the prevailing wind a tailwind in the home straight. This week the trophy event was the 100m so inevitably the night was all about the two sprints.

The evening opened with a 60m dash. Many used this as preparation for the 100m at the end of the evening. PBAs fell to **Kim Thomas** and **Geoff Brayshaw**, fresh back from the USA. **Keith Martin** and **Nick Miletic** equalled their age-group best too. .

It was good to see **Don Chambers** on a flying visit to his second home. Don produced a good long jump along with the two sprints. A notable landmark in the 800m was **Maurice Creagh's** first sub-3 minute run as an M65, as well as PBAs for **John Collier** and **Julie Wilson** (one of three on the night for her).

ECAC – November 24

Two state records were set on this final evening of November athletics. First **Melissa Foster** (10.67m) added 14cm to her W30 triple jump mark. This was followed by **Lajos Joni** (15.81m) extending his own M55 weight throw mark by 10cm.
