

# Champs return home

With a record number of entries, the main weekend of the championships returned to Ern Clark Athletic Centre to take advantage of the Mondo track. Some athletes were using the event as part of their build-up for the Nationals championships, some were complete newbies debuting on the track or returning after an absence of 'quite some time'. The organisers arranged for Barry Mullins to fly from North Queensland with his Finish Lynx equipment, to enable the championships to have electronic timing. This is the system that allowed Josh Clarke to record an Olympic 100m qualifier (10.15) in Canberra recently, as it enabled the race to be run down the back straight and avoid the headwind. The portable system takes several hours to set up but enables accuracy to within 1/1000th of a

second, with photo finish technology. As world and national records must be electronically timed for all distances up to 800m this gave the event the appropriate status that should be accorded State Championships.

In the 5000m, the Finish Lynx lap scoring system that is to be used at the World Championships in October was trialled. This allowed competitors to see how many laps they had completed and recorded each lap via a microchip in their race number.

Track queen Wendy Seegers received the Anne Shaw trophy for Athlete of the Meet setting state records in the 100m and 400m. Wendy was somewhat overcome with the honour and will set off to compete at the Australian open championships in Sydney at the end of the month with the best wishes of WAMA members. During the

championships Carol Bowman and David Carr were presented the Patron's Trophies for their recent victories in that event.

The championships ran smoothly which is testament to the organisational skills of Barbara and Richard Blurton. Richard is the head of the Local Organising Committee for Perth 2016 with Barbara the organiser of this event for the last decade, managing to keep pace with new technology and integrating it successfully each year. The success was also due to the many officials and volunteers who helped.. Officials were in short supply as the WALA State Championships were also on this weekend at Challenge Stadium. A relaxed John Oldfield ietted in from the United Kingdom for two weeks and officiated during the weekend. The barbecue afterwards was well attended.



Claire Walkley was the winner of the W50 event lapping in a metronomic fashion to post a 24:54.44. Kim Chandler (W55) with yet another top class performance also demonstrated good pace judgement in her 23:30.51 effort. Gillian Young (W65) put in a big effort after being spurred on by grandchildren Jayden and Sydelle and was rewarded with a big season's best 24:02.32 and Jackie Halberg (W65) stepped it up from her recent Sunday runs with 28:02.37.



# Rob's classy sub 17 victory

Rob Nichols (M35) was able to dictate the pace from the outset and his km splits reveal he was running within himself posting a 16:35.18 effort. Kim Thomas (M40) was also unchallenged in completing the journey in 17:11.15. Former Paralympic gold medallist, Paul Mitchell, celebrated his return to the masters' ranks after too long an absence, winning the M45 title in 18:10.31 from John Collier (20:58.57) and Andy Abbey (21:29.42). Andrew Davison (M50) set out with dogged determination and never lost focus returning a time of 17:45.00. Silver medal winner, David Solomon ran a tactical 22:37.92 to ensure some energy for later events.

In the M55 age group, Steven Giles upset more favoured rivals winning in a time of 18:59.81 edging out Kevin



Johnson (19:02.61) in a torrid battle for line honours. Keith Hill grabbed third place with his effort of 20:35.97 and Mark Dawson's 20:50.92 left him out of the medals but with a season's best. Alan Gower (M60) returned from Lyon with several classy performances ran 19:21.99 to score a win from Chris Maher (19:46.48) and former MAWA President Paul Hughes who came excruciatingly close to a sub 20-minute performance running 20:00.02! Versatile athlete Mark Hewitt crossed in 20:55.85 ahead of namesake Brian Hewitt (21:53.36).

Giovanni Puglisi (M65) won his age group with a 20:26.86 run ahead of the affable photographer Graeme Dahl returning a smartly composed 21:29.57. Jim Klinge (21:45.35) and Brian Danby (25:46.87) completed the field. Jim Langford's (M70) 20:31.49 was no surprise to those athletes availing themselves of the ECAC facilities on Thursday evenings having seen him churn out 3km races every fortnight, notwithstanding his Australian representative background. Bruce Wilson's second place time of 21:52.01 was also world class with Bob Hull running 23:19.47 for third. Bob Schickert ran fourth in 25:25.81 and then quickly resumed his job as track announcer for the meet. The M85 was won by Irwin Barrett-Lennard (31:51.00) well outside his own Australian record (28:28.5) from Cecil Walkley 54:39.58.

# Wendy and Karyn shine

Wendy Farrow (W45) completed a clean sweep of the 5000m walking title with her 32:14.54 effort. Karyn Tolardo (W50) walked over two minutes quicker than at last years' titles to win in 28:44.33 ahead of the lightly raced Cheryl-Lee Dean (31:31.61). Both Wendy and Karyn have availed themselves to the coaching of Rosemary Holloway and displayed the benefits over the course of the weekend. Lyn Ventris (W55), a multiple world title and record holder, paced herself perfectly to record a world class time of 26:30.13 in taking out the title. Julie Wilson (W60), who is experimenting with a new technique gold medalled in 35:13.34.

Elaine Dance (W65) showed her stamina from Sunday morning walks to walk a title winning 37:33.90. W70s Lynne Schickert once again walked a close race with Sylvia Byers (W80) never stretching the distance out to two or three metres finishing in 39:06.40 to 39:09.42 respectively. Sylvia was able to claim her second state record of the meet, a performance over a minute faster than the previous record holder's (Lorna Lauchlan) 40:13.87.

In his only performance at the championships Daniel Lowe (M40) won the gold medal in a time of 39:46.37. Notably, Garry Hastie (M50) (26:26.34) walked over four minutes faster than last year's time and M80's John Smith was unchallenged by technique or distance capturing the title in 40:35.18. Jeff Whittam's disqualification caused him no distress as he admits he is physically unable to comply with the rule but his satisfaction in completing the event was obvious to all.

Narelle Laurie (W40) announced herself to the walking community with her debut 1500m performance of 10:33.10 which will give her confidence for other races. Wendy Farrow (W45) used her amazing cadence to 'go the distance' in 9:09.76 followed by Janne Wells returning from injury (9:34.63). The tall and willowy Karyn Tolardo (W50) never troubled the judges in recording 8:08.64 for her gold

medal. Julie Wilson (W60) won her division four seconds quicker than last year in 10:04.04.

Sylvia Byers (W80) stuck to the reliable Lynne Schickert (W70) for the majority of the distance, which resulted in both women recording impressive performances. Lynne walking the distance in 11:25.40 and Sylvia 11:40.00 for respective wins. Noela Medcalf (W80)


won silver in 13:41.94. Garry Hastie (M50) walked the fastest time overall with a comfortable (for him) time of 7:28.46 and provided a master class in walking "taking it right to the edge, but never going over". John Dennehy (M55) walked a cautious 10:20.54 and Bunbury resident Harold Membrey (M60) gained another medal with his 11:30.77 effort.

# Wendy pips Janne for win

In the 3km event, Narelle Laurie (W40) showed grit, determination and good form to win the title in 22:21.92. W45's Wendy Farrow recorded an excellent 19:32.08 to win from Janne Wells (20:10.52) whose time is also creditable given her recent injury. Karyn Tolardo (W50), a fixture on the Thursday evenings at ECAC, stunned with the ease of her 17:02.04 performance going close to the sub 17-minute club. Julie Wilson (W60) walked over 35 seconds quicker than 2015, completing the journey in 21:15.63 with Elaine Dance winning the silver with a 21:54.43 effort. Lynne Schickert (W70) once again inadvertently acted as pacemaker for Sylvia Byers (W80).

The always smiling Sylvia focused on Lynne the whole distance, managing to increase her pace each time she looked in danger of slipping off the required pace. Her efforts were amply rewarded with a 30-second improvement on her own state record chalking up a 23:18.61 time for the gold medal. Lynne's stellar 23:16.32 walk gifted her a gold medal also. Luella Jenkins (W70) was the silver medallist in 23:54.45. Lorna Lauchlan confidently walked the distance in 26:36.34 despite an injury which has prevented her from replicating the form that brought her two world titles last year in Lyon.

Garry Hastie (M50) was over two minutes outside his state record, winning the title in an easy 16:36.84. Andrew Cuthbertson (M55) produced a time of 24:25.61 and secured his first gold medal. John Smith was untroubled technique wise and distance wise only taking 26:08.00 for the gold medal.

# Top guns stop clock with punishing runs

Daniel Leseberg's (M35) winning time was 25.90, with Lee Stergiou running a 25.43 followed by Maurice Pascal in 26.76 to medal in the M40 division. A hotly contested M45 race was won by Chris Neale in 25.15, overhauling Greg Brennan (25.91) late in the race and Mark Elms exactly one second in arrears. Rudy Kocis scored a fine win in 25.03, albeit with an eye towards his new age group, where the state record of Barrie Kernaghan of 25.10 must be in danger.

Martyn Cavanagh ran 25.81 for silver and Colin Smith's 26.29 brought him a well-earned bronze medal edging out Bernard Riviere (26.39) by a tenth of a second.

Campbell Till (M55) set a season's best time of 26.86 winning going away from the field, but injuring himself in the process and depriving him of running in his best event, the 400m. Tony Downey's silver in 29.79, notable given his lack of racing. Garry Ralston proved to be the best of the M60 sprinters as, gifted with a

massive stride, he picked up his cadence only marginally off the bend to run the silkiest 26.87 you will ever see.

Giovanni Puglisi (32.29), Nick Miletic (35.40) and Mike Anderson (42.80) were the medallists in the M65 division. Steven Crabbe's time in winning the M70 race was 36.57. Barrie Kernaghan (M75) stamped his authority on the field early coming off the bend, straightening up and 'heading for home' recording a superb 30.65.

# Sharon kicks to lead Jane to finish line

Kristy Devereux (W30) demonstrated her new level of fitness and confidence with a 2:46.36 time despite a lack of experience over the distance. Sharon Davis (W40) asserted her authority on the field coming off the break in the lead pack tracked closely by Jane Lockwood (W35) and Rosemary Giles (W40). Sharon and Jane gradually drew away from the field until Sharon 'kicked' with a confidence born of experience and quickly established a gap which she held until the line. Her reward was a 2:32.74. Jane's time was up there with her best (2:34.71) and she collected a gold medal for her efforts.

Vanessa Carson (W35) will be a threat with more two-lap racing under her belt as her time of 2:43.72 attests. Niamh Keane (W50) set off confidently with her enviable style and held it all the way to the line, chalking up a 2:39.04. Margaret Saunders (W60) clocked a world class time of 2:47.91 showing she is over a sustained period of injury and illness. Carol Bowman (W60) ran up to her form in a 3:14.17. Gold medallist in the W55, Kim Chandler, ran 3:07.93 again



indicating promise given her inexperience with track racing.


Multi-eventer Mick O'Toole won the M40's with 2:36.62 edging out sprinter Maurice Pascal who ventured up in distance but had the sprint taken out of him by the fast early pace still managed a 2:38.76. Wayne Byram's 3:12.77 gave him a bronze medal. Chris Neale (M45) led from go to whoa with assertive and aggressive tactics posting a 2:20.61 a just

reward for his bravery. He switched off at the 600m with little incentive to 'push on' for the win. David Solomon's victory in the M50's only took him 2:32.54 seconds.

The newest member of the M55's, Mark Dawson, was untroubled to win with a 2:25.98. Tony Downey's 2:47.25 was not a true indication of his undoubted ability, but it scored him the silver medal. Stuart Moore was the bronze medallist in 2:55.57. Brian Hewitt won the M60's gold medal in 2:47.15 and Giovanni Puglisi (M65) accrued yet another gold medal with his effort of 2:42.52, ahead of Graeme Dahl (2:52.93) and Maurice Creagh (3:10.05). Bob Hull collected the gold medal in the M70's with a sub 3-minute performance of 2:58.84, ahead of 'sub 3 aspirant' Ivan Brown, who showed a return to form closing in on his target with 3:03.70. Mike O'Reilly won the M75's recording 4:07.66 and David Carr (M80) in a performance belying his age, has rarely looked better this season in returning a 3:15.71. Cecil Walkley won the M85 gold medal.




# Andy inks deal with golden run

'Inked up' Andy Taylor (M35) set the fastest time overall with a 7.51 followed by Daniel Leseberg in 7.85. New Dad M40 Lee Stergiou, ran 7.58 as he led home Chris Morgan in 8.14. Karl Weber ran 7.81 to beat 400m specialist Mark Elms with 8.20 in the M45 division.

Impressive sprinting by Rudi Kocis, despite being at the very end of the M50-54 age group, produced a winning time of 7.70. Garry Ralston's M55 state record of 7.77 will be in his sights at 'world's later in the year. In a strong division, Bernie Riviere won silver in 7.96 and Kim Taylor was in third (7.98). Colin Smith, in fourth, recorded 8.16 followed by Martyn Cavanagh (8.30), Gin Ang (8.50) and Peter Watene (10.46). Peter's run all the more significant in that he has dropped over 40kgs since his first master's run in July of 2015, where he pulled a 'hammy'. Tony Downey was unchallenged in the M55's running 9.09.

Garry Ralston (M60), recently hampered by a hamstring tear, still managed an 8.01 to silver medallist Michael Byrne in 9.23 and Harold Membrey with 9.98. Renowned distance runner, Giovanni Puglisi (M65),



demonstrated excellent raw speed winning in 9.68 leading Nick Miletic home with a 10.43. Medallists in the M70 race were Ted Miller 9.91, Steven Crabbe 10.12 and Bob Hull 10.44. Barrie Kernaghan's raw

speed showed as he covered the distance in 9.33 close on his heels was David Clive in 9.55 and Lyle James 13.36. Gordon Medcalf's very tanned legs got him over the line comfortably in 15.35 seconds.













Once again Wendy Seegers set a new state recordbreaking former world title holder Barbara Blurton's record (58.4) with a 56.99 time. Sharon Davis remained focused to run 64.49 for second and Rosemary Giles' 71.64 revealing a good turn of speed for a distance runner.

Sue Bourn (W45), always a threat over any distance, ran 77.47 to drag Juliana Kelly (W50) to a sub 80 mark (79.69). Kim Chandler (W55) debuted over 400m with a winning performance of 84.23, with the vastly experienced Margaret Saunders (W60) seemingly casually striding around in a fast 74.05 Peggy Macliver (W70) added to her medal collection winning in 86.29.









# One lap dash

Rob Nichols M35 rounded out his programme with a visit to an unfamiliar distance and posted a very respectable time of 58.22 and a gold medal. Lee Stergiou (M40) gold in 56.58, ran a controlled race benefitting by the presence of the M45's, especially over the final stages as four athlete's battled out for bragging rights. Chris Neale (M45) secured victory in 56.37, multitalented Mark Jeffery silver in 56.78 and Mark Elms a very hard fought 57.85 for bronze.

Colin Smith (M50) ran a season's best of 58.55 to grab a gold medal and Mark Dawson (M55) ran a 65.27 ahead of the lightly raced Tony Downey 67.82, giving them gold and silver medals respectively. Giovanni Puglisi (M65) capped off an amazing series of races with victory in 73.31. Sadly, Henri Cortis was struck by injury early in his 800m race depriving the crowd of a possible battle royale.

Michael Byrne impressed all with his victory in the M60 running 68.62. Rob 'Tolli' Antoniolli suffered an injury early on and 'did not finish'. 



# Vicki and Robyn snare gold

In the 80m hurdles, Vicki Cobby (W40) won gold in 15.81 from Sue Coate (17.81), both well outside Eileen Hindle's state record of 11.8. In the W45's division, Robyn Feutrill eclipsed silver medallist, Delia Baldock's state record by .03 with her 17.33. Delia pushed her to this time with her 17.68 effort.

In another of her heptathlon disciplines, the (W35) 100m hurdles, Melissa Foster went a pleasing 17.31 for the gold medal.

The only male sprint hurdler, Mark Jeffery hit every hurdle until he pushed the eighth hurdle down thereby disqualifying himself. The bigger picture for him, of October and the world title in the decathlon remains and his effort to take advantage of every racing opportunity is to be admired.

Sharon Davis' sound technique carried her to a 75.12 win ahead of a very fatigued Vicki Cobby (87.59) in the W40 400m hurdles. In the M45 event, Mark Elms, Lyon 2015 semi-finalist, recorded 72.13 for the title.

Over the 300m distance, Robyn Feutrill led Delia Baldock by a short distance winning 60.11 to 66.33.

Garry Ralston set a state record with a blistering time of 48.15 shattering Norm Richard's 52.15 time from 1998. For reference, this time is outside world-class hurdler Richard Trembath's Australian record of 45.19, but considering Garry's inexperience, injury and 'agricultural' technique must be attainable if he wishes. Harold Membrey ran a 69.14 for the silver medal.






# Matt feeds off rivalry

Andrew Ward (M50) defended his title, sending the 700gm javelin out further than last year to 35.72m (less than six metres away from Frances Leong's state record of 41.52. Garry Hastie, "walker from 1994). extraordinaire" revealed real talent with a brief foray into thrower's territory unleashing a 32.52m throw for a silver medal.

Wayne Rubick (M55) scored a win with a 19.92m performance. Jo Peters (M60) nearly threw a state record (Ossie Igel's 32.52m) his winning effort of 31.78m being 74cm short, to take the win against Mark Hewitt (25.22m). Geoff Brayshaw's (M65) winning throw was, likewise, less than 5m outside Stan Selby's state record from 2012 of 38.63m with his best attempt of 33.98m. Greg Wilson filled the silver medal position with a 25.15m throw. Stan Selby (M70) wiped Rob Shand's state record of 31.21m off the books with his winning effort of 38.61m. 








# Melissa adds another gold to her haul



Nicolette Whittington (W55) impressed with her best effort of 3.81m. Gay Wyatt (W60) added the horizontal








# Mick snares gold medal



## 2016 State Athletics Championships



Anyone who has retrieved the 7.26kg shot put would be able to appreciate the distances achieved by the M40 and M45 athletes. Matt Staunton's winning distance of 12.02m and John Fettus' 11.42m are the result of endless hours of gym work and refining technique to harness speed with this strength. No less impressive was Todd Davey's (M45) 13.82m winning throw. Todd currently sits at sixth in the Australian open rankings with his recent state record of 15.04m. Andrew Ward (M50) threw 9.80m to defeat placegetters Tim Lyons (9.36m) and Peter Watene (7.86m). In the M55 category, Wayne Rubick (M55) threw agonisingly short of the 8m mark (7.99m) for his title. The M60 trio all produced fine performances with Geoff Gee (12.45m) winning over Tom Gravestock (11.96m) and Jo Peters (11.33m). Oswald Igel's 11.48m best gave him the gold medal over Greg Wilson (8.45m) and John Ventris (6.75m). Gold and silver in the M70's went to Rob Young (8.23m) and Jeff Bowen (7.91m). State record holder Jim Davis (9.87m) presided over John Cochrane (8.83m) in the M80's with M85 Christian Tittel outside his record with his winning effort (6.66m).

#### Hammer

Matt Staunton's (M40) winning effort of 44.47m, a season's best, took out the hammer title and holds him at 16<sup>th</sup> on the open Australian list. Todd Davey won the M45 title with a best throw of 39.08m. His 44.75m from earlier this season ranks him as 13th on the open Australian list. The M50 event was won by Tim Lyons with a throw of 32.55m over consistent



performer Andrew Ward (23.12m). Wayne Rubick won the M55's title with an effort of 22.07m. Tom Gravestock (M60) revelled in the contest with a 43.20m winning throw (eclipsing his own state record of 42.38m in the process), Jo Peters filled second place (37.84m) and Geoffrey Gee was third with his 35.69m effort. Oswald Igel (M65) threw 35.44m, Jim Davis (M80) 30.79m and Christian Tittel (M85) 20.04m were all unopposed but threw top class distances to take out their respective age groups.

#### Discus

Matt Staunton threw a 36.88m to head Mick O'Toole's 26.64m to win the M40 title. Unsurprisingly M45 Todd Davey spun the 2kg platter way out to a distance of 41.86m for his gold medal. His early season's best throw of 44.08m ranks him number 13 on the open Australian list. The M50 competition was eventually taken out by Ian Cotton 36.45m who responded well to strong competition from the other



placegetters, Tim Lyons (36.01m) and Andrew Ward (31.25m). The M55 title was won by Wayne Rubick throwing a distance of 23.22m. Tom Gravestock (M60) 41.24m survived an unexpected challenge from Jo Peters (40.06m) with Geoffrey Gee grabbing a bronze medal with a 37.96m effort. M65's Oswald Igel revelling in his new age group with a plethora of state records recently threw a mighty 40.96m to put the title into his hands. Greg Wilson using the technique more than strength threw 28.40m from Nick Miletic (23.34m) ironically relying more on strength than technique for the third place. M70 Jeff Bowen (21.69m) squeezed out the win from former title holder Rob Young (21.51m). In the M80 event, Jim Davis responded to the challenge of John Cochrane, needing a clutch throw of 24.27m to gain top place on the podium. John's best of 22.10m fended off javelin specialist, Robert Shand's best of 17.98m. Christian Tittel threw 17.73m to win from Gordon Medcalf (11.44m).



It was back to WAAS for the 2000m and 3000m steeplechase events followed by the hammer a few days later.



# Competitors conquer 25 lap challenge

The State 10km was one of the events held prior to the main weekend of competition. Luckily the temperature had dropped after a warm day and after instructions were given to officials and competitors alike, the event proceeded with an enthusiastic gallery. Winner of the W35 event, Monique Thomas ran a controlled race showing great discipline determination. A recent road best in Busselton in the 57-minute region gave her confidence and she posted a comparable track time of 59:13.5.

Clare Wardle (W40) a proven performer over Sunday runs in both cross-country and road events scored a win in 41:54.7 from Trish Farr in 46:36.8. Sue Bourn (W45) showed great consistency recording 47:02.9 compared to her winning time last year of 47:10.8. Jacqui McQueen ran most of the distance with Monique only drawing away over the final few laps to go a 57:27.7. Gillian Young (W65), after going through the half-way point close to her season's best carried on gamely, running close to even splits to reward herself with a 50:23.1.

In the men's event held concurrently, Adrian Fabiankovits (M30) ran a strong and controlled pace to get home in



40:48.5. An M30 competitor, Rob Nichols, ran the second fastest overall time of the evening 34:56.5. Kim Thomas (M40) cruised around the blue track in 36:26.1 taking the gold medal from silver medallist, the smooth-striding Steve Weller, running 36:57.4 in his only championship performance for 2016 and Hamish McLeod claiming bronze in 38:57.6. Paul Mitchell (M45) showed more than a glimpse of his talent running 41:42.7 to win the title, followed by John


Collier, who after a suitably conservative start, held his pace strongly in the second half to record 46:39.2.

M50 competitor Clemens Schmitt ran the fastest overall time of the evening 34:51.6 ahead of the fast closing Rob Nichols. The silver medal was taken by Andrew Davison in 38:16.2 with David Solomon completing the dais with 41:41.8. Ross Keane's fourth place effort was 44:12.6. Former world silver medallist (from Gateshead, State Record M40 31:49.32) Trevor Scott displayed his fitness running 37:51.7 and mixed it with runners many years his junior. Keith Hill won silver 42:47.3 and Mark Dawson secured the bronze medal with 43:45.2.

Alan Gower (M60) won the gold medal with a performance of 40:27.9, Chris Maher not far behind in 40:53.1. Giovanni Puglisi's (M65) 41:56.7 took the title from Keith Miller in (46:08.1) bronze went to Maurice Creagh (56:16.2) and fourth place was Frank Price 61:39.6. Jim Langford (M70) was untroubled to win in a world-class time of 42:15.7 from Bruce Wilson (46:18.0) and Bob Schickert (54:33.4). Irwin Barrett-Lennard ran 61:27. 3 to smash his state record from last year (61:43.3) in the M85 division.












# Melissa takes honours with top score

Melissa Foster (W35) scored a total of 2761 points for the win and the highest score of the day amongst the 10 women who graced the ECAC compound on Saturday, March 12. This was a mere eight points short of her score in winning set last year. A full complement of competitors in the W40 division ensured strong competition especially given the different strengths of those involved. Vicki Cobby garnered a total of 2360 points to outscore Donna Abbey (1685) and Zoe Richards (1491) respectively. In the W45 division, Di Kelly's 2298 points were enough to fend off a determined challenge from Sue Bourn (2133) who finished in the silver place, despite a fall in possibly her best disciple, the 800m, and current state record holder Sue Coate (2056).

Carol Bowman, in the W60 event accrued a total of 2021 points to win the gold medal from Julie Wilson (1620) and Lynne Schickert (W70) took out her age group with 1108 points and an inspirational 800m run that helped bond the competitors to finish the event on a high note.

In the men's pentathlon, it was disappointing to see only eight 'competitors' each representing separate age groups, thus being deprived of valuable competition. Some athletes decided to go through the motions to save



themselves for the main state championships, others focusing on their specialty discipline. Mick O'Toole (M40) demonstrated strength across the board, notably a javelin effort (42.83m) scoring 537 points, discus (27.55m) 471 points in his total of 1992 points. Chris Neale (M45) scored the highest total of the day (2976 points) with an exceptional 200m time of 25.0 (754 points) and long jump distance of 5.44m (648 points). A tough competitor, right back to his Little Athletics days, he eased off in the 1500m with no incentive to push for a fast time and resultant points score.

M45 athlete, Ian Cotton, had his usual strong discus with a 33.87m best (465

points) and javelin 34.83m (575points). His 200m sprint time of 27.6 (614 points) combined with a fine opening long jump of 4.63m (519 points) provided him with a fine total of 2598 points. M55 entrant, John Dennehy hit his best long jump of the season of 3.40m (283 points) but struggled home in the 1500m. Harold Membrey (M60) ran the 200m in 33.5 (366 points), long jumped 3.39m (283 points) and amassed 1614 points, making the journey from Bunbury worthwhile. Nick Miletic (M65) accumulated 1930 points slightly more weighted towards the throwing disciplines than in the past. With a top javelin effort (25.54m) rewarded with 459 points, he had no trouble finishing with a strong 1500m, despite the increasing heat.

M70 competitor Ivan Brown, back from a niggling calf injury lasting several months, was still able to rely on a quality 1500m time of 6:37.8 (670 points) to bolster his score to over the 2000 level (2083 points). A surprising turn of speed in the 200m sprint of 36.6 (474 points) set him up for a big score, but it was his middle distance credentials that came to the fore. Leon Sander (M75) scored 2002 points total with a stellar effort across the five disciplines. Given his slight runner's frame, his discus of 21.67m (485 points) was commendable. Also a 200m sprint in 36.6 credited his score with 474 points.

June Streeter recorded a score of 1785 points in the same age group for second place. Bev Hamilton (W70) scored 3735 points which earnt her a state record.

John Fettus (M40) won the state title with 2608 points. In the M45 age group, Todd Davey totalled 2790 points, although well down on his 2015 state record of 3876 points. Andrew Ward's M50 score of 2151 points gave him the state title. In the M60 event, Tom Gravestock's efforts produced a total of 3479 points to hold off


# Giovanni makes splash in 2000m dash




Gillian Young took out the W65 category in 10:14.4 with the field completed by Lynne Schickert (W70) who
