The coolish conditions in the mornings suited the distance runners. with temperatures rising to help sprinters in the afternoon. The field event competitors just had to weather it all.

The Ern Clark Athletic Centre is a more intimate setting that seems to suit Masters athletes. Evident this year was the pleasing emergence of new talent but also the return to form of more experienced athletes, surely the sign of a healthy club.

Winner of the Anne Shaw trophy for the performance of the meet was David Carr, after a very serious challenge from multiple global champion thrower, Byrony Glass. Such is the talent on show that a performance that would shatter the world record in a few months time was needed to have your name engraved on the prestigious trophy.

Those that performed these tasks were thanked profusely and are truly appreciated.

The strong social atmosphere was a feature of the weekend with families and friend's raucous support of competitors and several signs held by children (pre- pre- masters) on the sidelines. The traditional barbecue that is held at the completion of the programme was well attended as all those involved relived the events of the weekend some shrouded in bandages, some smothered in sunscreen and some swathed in medals of varying colours.





5000m



The women's 5000m was taken out by Vanessa Carson (W35) in a fine time of 18:38.12. Aiming for anything below the 19-minute barrier, she is reaping the rewards from an increase in distance as she aims for the Perth marathon in a few months time. Clare Wardle (W40) picked up another title with an even paced run leading the field early on before finishing in 19:27.65.

Jacqueline Kellerman is a welcome newcomer to MAWA ranks and surprised many with her silver medal performance amongst a stellar field running 19:35.52. The W50s event was won convincingly by Kerin Thompson who is adapting to track running well coming from a multi-sport background, returning a quality time of 21:42.77. The remaining medals were won by Simone Solomon (23:10.13) and Sue Bourn (23:14.87). Judy Davis continues to impress with her efforts in this age group. Her brief time in the sport continues to be punctuated by efforts beyond anything she would have ever imagined doing last year. She is a runner to the core. Sue Zlnay (W55) sat on a steady pace and used her lethal kick to run 21:28.80.

Gillian Young (W65) continued to race herself into form with a stellar effort of 24:39.76 and Jackie Halberg (W70) would have to pleased with her effort of 28:10.87 for the 12 and a half lap journey.

5000m marks track start


The 5000m for men was held on Saturday, before the heat of the day struck, with Giovanni Puglisi (M65) racing the distance conservatively in 20:48.60 to add to his title haul. Graeme Dahl (M65) ran his usual honest race to earn his medal, coming home strongly in 20:51.70 to put Giovanni on notice. Brian Bennett won bronze in 22:52.08 followed by Lui Cecotti and Frank Price. A classy field in the M70s was duly won by Jim Langford in 22:31.27 just ahead of Jim Klinge (22:36.67) with Bruce Wilson showing good fitness to record 23:02.90 with David

Baird running fourth in 23:18.73 and Bob Hull next in 23:33.99. Bob Schickert (M75) gradually increased the distance on Morland Smith to finish in 26:26.21. Morland capturing silver with 27:23.47. Irwin Barrett-Lennard (31:46.96) was untroubled in winning the M85 title.

In the M30-64 5000m race there was no surprise as Rob Nichols (M35) led from pillar-to-post to add to his golden collection in 16:41.02. Primarily a steeplechaser (state record holder and world silver bronze medallist) he is a confident runner and tactically astute. M40 winner, Kim Thomas (M40) had a great race 17:41.46 against Chris Lark (M35) 17:41.66. Chris secured silver and Grant Perry a bronze (20:34.96). Bryant Burman was the silver medallist in the M40's adapting from the road to the track with ease. Adrian Fabiankovits (M30) looked fresh coming in with 19:01.64 for a state title. Alan Gray (M50) a Tuesday evening WAAS regular, used great pace judgement to record 21:21.89 tracking Paul Scott-Taylor (M55) who continues to execute his race plans to perfection, for most of the journey. Employing an analytical eye to his races Paul has been improving with every race this season.





200m




Cath Payne (W40) 29.53 and Lisa Limonas (W45) 29.83 were the only female sprinters to crack the 30-second barrier with their winning times. Jennifer Parker (31.98) showed good strength in the straight with her silver medal effort. Cathy McCloskey (W50) showed a pleasing return to form in the 200m, seizing the crown in a sizzling 30.22. Juliana Kelly tracked her the whole way with a terrific bend to post a 32.10 for silver.

Sue Bourn picked up another medal (32.69) with a slim margin back to Simone

Solomon (32.74). Nicolette Whittington (W55) closed fast in 33.78 ahead of Delia Baldock (35.55). Carol Bowman (W60) strode to victory in 37.83 behind W65 winner Maureen Keshwar (37.08).

Peggy Macliver (W70) turned back the clock, or so it seemed, with her 34.99 time in the 200m. She came off the bend with great speed and maintained her form through to the line in a display of quality sprinting. Brenda Painter earnt her silver medal with a 44.00 performance. Ruth Johnson's 39.34 for the W75 title is an exceptional time.

Carl Heslop (M30) won the 200m in 27.93 with Syed Mohammed Ad'ha Alju winning the M40s in the day's only sub 26 clocking (25.64). Edward Beer collected a silver medal running a strong bend posting 26.15. Greg Brennan was untroubled by the distance to win the M45 crown in 26.36. Colin Smith (M50) adjusted his style from the indoors event to run 26.02 and score the title. Mark Dawson was the M55 gold medallist only doing the minimum for the win. Des Walsh (M60) moved up on Tony Downey just metres from the line to seize the title and post a 29.88. Tony ran his heart out and for most of the journey looked the winner; a lack of racing proving his downfall. He was nonetheless delighted with his medal. Barry Newell proved his calf injury has finally healed and was a thoroughly deserving bronze medal winner. Any man in the 65-69 age groups

that goes under 30 seconds for the 200m is a class act and Michael Byrne is a worthy recipient of this moniker with 29.58. Harold Membrey 32.50 held form under pressure to stave off Giovanni Puglisi (32.74) with Greg Kennedy (33.88) and Nick Miletic (33.96) following. Ivan Brown showed a surprising turn of speed (35.19) to claim the M70 crown from 100m winner, Ted Miller (45.42). Ivan has extended his repertoire over the last few seasons venturing into the patron's Trophy and high jump and sprints. With little fanfare, he makes his mark with his athleticism and competitive spirit. Brian Waldhhuter (M75) ran 34.86 for his title ahead of Lyle James. David Carr (M80) had a great start and ran an aggressive bend to set up his race, his endurance bringing him home in 37.16. Irwin Barrett-Lennard (M85) won from Stan Lockwood running a 44.27.

Carl Heslop (M30) 2:24.47, Grant Perry (M35) 2:39.27 and Damien Franklin (M40) 3:02.95, all won unopposed with the win gaining priority over times. In the M45's, elegant Xander van Rijen was imperious with his win never in doubt. Despite an ongoing knee problem, his quality training was put to good use running even splits and posting 2:15.49 – extraordinary. Andy Abbey fought hard for his silver (2:29.83) with Chris Groom in a pleasing 2:39.15.

Showing great potential, the lithe and long striding Colin Smith (M50) 'jogged' the first 600m and picked the pace up to run 2:34.21. John McShane, showing huge improvements in fitness in his first season of masters' athletics, ran into silver with 2:50.78. Mark Dawson (M55) got to the front early in the race to avoid trouble and stayed there, returning a 2:28.12 for gold. The real battle was for the other medals with Campbell Till, returning from injury running a tactically superior race to out kick Keith Hill in the home straight posting 2:33.03 to Hill's 2:34.44. Akos Gyarmathy (M60) won in a stylish 2:47.04 from Brian Hewitt (2:57.91).

The M65 and M70 competitors were grouped together which provided a great

spectacle for the crowd. Michael Byrne (M65) led the field home in 2:47.39 with the photo finish sorting the athletes out behind him. The pictures suggested the naked eye was deceived, with times of Giovanni Puglisi (M65) 2:52.06, Henri Cortis (M70) 2:52.18 and Ross Goulden (M70) 2:52.58, separating the competitors. The athletes' varying body angles on the invisible finish suggesting differently. William Hart (M65) gained a bronze in 3:19.66 with David Baird (M70) renewed tactics suggesting a sub 3-minute result is within his grasp. He ran 3:00.30 for bronze.

In the M70 age group, Bob Hull finished in 3:05.60 for fourth, with Ivan Brown (3:09.29) and Maurice Creagh (3:21.31) following. Bert Carse (M75) put in a strong surge at the 500m mark to pass David Carr (M80) and drag him to a 3:05.18 finish. Bert's 3:04.10 won him the M75 title with David's time under the world record for M85s, the division he will enter in a few months time. This performance by David was considered the "Performance of the meet" winning him the Anne Shaw trophy. Bob Schickert (M75) took silver with a tactical run, with Lyle James in bronze. Cecil Walkley won the M85 title.




Sharon stars as Barbara breaks record

Sadly the entrants in the Women's 800m event totalled seven, meaning just one race. However, Global 2016 finalist, Sharon Davis (W40) had the opportunity and honour of running against her inspiration, Barbara Blurton. She even ran the race in the same way, assertive and aggressive from the outset. Sharon came off the final bend 'slingshotting' her way to victory in 2:32.05.

Vanessa Carson (W35) gave a good account of herself (2:34.70) considering her credentials as a distance runner. Vicki Cobby (W45) went way under the threeminute barrier with a 2:56.90 employing her pentathlon experience to pick up another title. Simone Solomon (W50) ran a steady race and unwittingly acted as a pacemaker. Simone finished in 3:00.77 after an epic battle up the straight with Barbara Blurton, who smashed the state record in the process. The previous record (3:02.2) of Peggy Macliver was set in a pentathlon, no less.

The barefooted Erica Mercer (W70) and Ruth Johnson (W75) took out their respective titles unopposed.

In the W40 60m, Cath Payne ran a slick 8.90 for gold relegating Donna Abbey (9.31) to silver. Lisa Limonas (W45) won in 9.1 ahead of Jennifer Parker (9.81) and Janne Wells (10.58). The competitive W50 race saw victory taken by Sue Coate in 9.66 closely followed by Sue Bourn (9.73), Juliana Kelly (9.74), Fran Cherry (9.84) and Simone Solomon (10.99). Nicolette Whittington crossed the lime in 9.84 for the W55 title ahead of Delia Baldock (10.89). Maureen Keshwar, riding high on the back of her pentathlon title, zipped through in 9.93.

World class sprinter, Peggy Macliver (W70), has shifted her focus to the shorter distances recently with good success. In 10.50 seconds the champion was crowned, leaving the other medals to Brenda Painter (11.63) and Luella Jenkins (11.81). Ruth Johnson, an underrated athlete at the best of times, got her chance to shine with a scintillating time of 11.51 win.

In the 60m sprint, Syed Mohammed Ad'ha Alju (M40) introduced himself to MAWA athletics posting a 7.70 time for the win. Fellow debutante, Sam Wong won his silver medal with 7.90 and Edward Beer ran 8.08 for bronze. Karl Weber (M45) muscled his way to the line in 7.92 seconds over Greg Brennan in 8.23.

Fresh from his exploits in Daegu, Colin Smith used his brilliant start to record 8.04 a step in front of Kim Taylor (8.19) and the improving Gin Ang (8.37). Mark Dawson went sub ten (9.96) easily accounting for John Dennehy (11.57). Des Walsh (M60) scorched over the distance in 9.13 winning from Tony Downey (9.26) in a thrilling tussle.

Rob Nichols (M35) appeared to lope along in the 1500m, as his 4:36.89 run continued his series of consistent races. Carl Heslop (M30) ran a controlled race as did Damien Franklin (M40) to take their respective titles. Andrew Spratt (M45) ran with long hair flailing behind a la John Walker, to capture his title in the metric mile in 4:56.18. Andy Abbey's silver was hard fought in 5:29.26, with 5:51.91 enough for Chris Groom to snatch bronze.

John McShane won the M50 crown in 5:40.97 over Alan Gray (5:52.62), both up with their season's best. Mark Dawson (M55) added to his gold medal haul with 5:19.16 ahead of distance runner Paul Scott-Taylor (6:01.55). Bjorn Dybdahl (M60) arrived in Perth the night before on a flight from China and ran 5:27.66 in his customary dogged style for the win, Akos Gyarmathy scored silver in 5:48.77 and Brian Hewitt looked comfortable with a 5:54.37 for bronze. Giovanni Puglisi (M65) 5:41.97 took the gold from 10km bronze medal winner Frank Price.

Jim Klinge (M70) scraped under six minutes with 5:59.89 for the title in his usual determined manner, Bruce Wilson taking silver in 6:18.48 with David Baird in third (6:20.16) after a stirring sprint finish. Bert Carse (M75) looked imposing with his 6:19.89 run with Bob Schickert again steady clocking 7:13.64.

Morland Smith snared bronze in 7:35.75. David Carr's title was won in 6:42.13 (within four seconds of the M85 World Record). Cecil Walkley (M85) took the title with a comfortable run.

Cath Payne (14.33) sprinted to victory over Donna Abbey (15.18) in the W40 100m dragging Jennifer Parker (W45) along to a 15.5 run for her championship title. Sue Coate (15.17) enhanced her multi-event claims with a decisive victory in the W50s over Juliana Kelly (15.44), Sue Bourn (15.77), Simon Solomon (16.07) and Fran Cherry (16.30). W55 Delia Baldock (17.25) cruised along unopposed for her victory as did Maureen Keshwar (W65) in 16.11.

Peggy Macliver laid claims to the sprint treble with a 16.8 time in the blue riband event. The other W70s left in her wake were Brenda Painter (19.22) and Luella Jenkins (19.93). Once again Ruth Johnson's time in the W75 division of 18.63 was a class effort.

Colin Smith (M50) was always in command in his race turning in a surprisingly quick 12.71 over Kim Taylor (12.96) dipping under 13 seconds. Gin Ang ran 13.48 despite shin splints and a heavy travelling schedule for his bronze. Mark Dawson (M55) continued his recovery from illness with good sprinting (16.21) to John Dennehy's 17.31, both athletes a few seconds away from early season's efforts.

Des Walsh went 14.67 with a very tight hamstring for the M60 title. Michael Byrne (M65) 'glided' to victory in 14.68 with Harold Membrey showing great speed in 15.55 and Nick Miletic scored a hard fought bronze (16.16) ahead of Greg Kennedy. Ted Miller ran 16.13 to grab the M70 title over middle distance runner Ivan Brown (17.17).

Brian Waldhuter, another Bunbury sprinter, won the M75 division in 16.44 with Mike O'Reilly in silver with 16.76 and Lyle James in third. Irwin Barrett-Lennard (M85) ventured into sprinter territory winning in 20.41, relegating Stan Lockwood to silver in 26.79.




Evergreen Irwin Barrett-Lennard shows a style that belies his age to win the gold medal.

In taking the M30 crown, Carl Heslop ran 1:02.47. Despite no history in the event, Syed Mohammed Ad'ha Alju headed out strongly and fought off the lactic acid monster in the straight to post a sterling 1:05.65.

Colin Smith (M50) demonstrated tactical nous in his 57.59 victory. Showing no signs of fatigue he held his form well in the run to the line in a very impressive 'solo' run. Mark Dawson won in 1:07.15,

having to ignore Campbell Till who suffered a 'hammy' pull before midway through the first bend, hopefully just a 'blip' in his recovery from a serious foot injury.

In the M60s, Des Walsh overhauled early leader, Bjorn Dybdahl, within the shadows of the post, running 1:08.02 to grab the title by .47 of a second. Brian Hewitt ran third, his long stride taking him to a 1:15.59. Michael Byrne displayed perfect form, winning as he liked in 1:07.53. Second placer, Harold Membrey, finished his busy program with a 1:22.03.

Third place went to Nick Miletic in 1:27.24. Mike O'Reilly (M75) returned to form clocking 1:24.20 in winning ahead of Lyle James. The brilliant David Carr (M80) showed composure, strength and determination in equal measure to record 1:21.03 in a superb display. Cecil Walkley (M85) ran 3:45.21 to win his age group.

Cath Payne scored the sprint 'quad' with her win in the W40 400m, closing it out with 1:10.35. Vicky Cobby, despite undertaking a massive programme put together a beautiful 'quarter' in 69.64, the only women to go under 70 seconds.

Cathy McCloskey (W50) was no less impressive as she resisted the temptation to go out too hard for the first half and apportioned her effort to run 1:11.01, a significant improvement on her Perth 2016 result. Juliana Kelly also ran well to add another medal (silver) with Simone Solomon in bronze. Delia Baldock captured the W55 crown with a 1:29.12 with Carol Bowman (W60) showing rare aggression to record a 1:24.91 and the win.

Barbara Blurton (W65) gave a lesson in 400m running with a return to the sport after a decade out from a series of injuries. Many present had never seen her run and only a search through the records would indicate her talent. Running even splits with a distinctive high back-kick style that has been refined, she clocked 1:15.97.

Erica Mercer (W70) returned 1:42.92 for the distance and Ruth Johnson's 1:37.93 enhanced her reputation for quality runs taking out the W75 event.







Lisa ignores injury to win



Andrew Ward relies on his fast twitch fibres rather than brute strength and took out his age group with a 24.68m throw. The former sprinter is compiling a reputation as a consistent performer.

Jo Peters (M60) was unchallenged to score gold with 36.32m. Ossi Igel (M65) added to his reputation with a measured throw of 32.37m and Rob Young (M70) scored his title throwing 20.39m. John Fettus (M40) won with a 37.63m and Peter Tua (M45) was able to win with a 27.04m effort. There was little between Jim Davis, gold with 29.61m and Bob Fergie, silver with 27.56m as they battled out the M80 competition.

The 5000m walk allowed Bunbury's Garry Hastie (M55) to compete under competition rules with the watchful eyes of accredited walks judges. The 2017 state open champ for 10km, his superbly smooth technique is both a little intimidating and inspirational. He won with a time of 27:25.31 after stringing the field out behind him. Daniel Lowe (M40) took out his division in 34:11.71 and Wayne Byram (M45) added to his substantial medal collection with a win in 36:30.06.

John Mcdonagh (M65) presented a safe technique to the judges to win in 38:42.92. Fastest women's walker, Karyn Tolardo (W50), is possessed of a fierce competitive instinct and covered the distance efficiently, clocking in with a time of 29:37.73. Wendy Farrow (W45) kept up her incredible cadence lap after lap to securing victory her age group 33:05.95.

Su Lloyd's win took 41:45.77 minutes for the W65 crown, Lynne Schickert (W75) finishing just ahead of her in 40:30.34 for her title.

Chief walks judge, Marion Buchanan, noted her comments from the morning's event were followed with improved technique from many competitors in the 1500m event. Karyn Tolardo (W50) a multiple global medallist was untroubled to pick up another title walking 8:17.15. Behind her, Wendy Farrow (9:15.89) outlasted Janne Wells (9:34.95) after a fine contest. Su Lloyd (W60) and Lynne Schickert (W75) won their respective titles. Garry Hastie (M55) was also in record-setting form with 7:24.21 over the metric mile shattering the old record by more than 30 seconds. He believes he can go faster still and by a significant margin. In walking 9:29.88 Daniel Lowe (M40) never appeared to move out of second gear to win his age group.

John Mcdonagh (M65) who also savours the longer events nevertheless covered the distance quickly in 10:23.41 for gold, Harold Membrey collecting another medal with 11:34.8. Bruce Wilson (M70) put aside his running form to walk a tactical race, scoring gold in 10:18.01.

The walkers were consistent with their performances over all three distances. In the 3000m walk, Wendy Farrow taking the W45 title in 19:22.72 and Janne Wells in silver with 21:13.76. Karyn Tolardo (W50) strode purposely over the distance in a title-winning time of 17:15.43, with Luella Jenkins (W70) and Lynne Schickert (W75), also winning titles. In addition, Lynne's time (23:23.52) was also a state record.

Garry Hastie (M55) cemented his place as the premiere performer in men's walks with a stunning 15:39.65, a time many would be happy to run for 3km. Daniel Lowe (M40) walked 19:27.50.

The main weekend of competition was held on the following Saturday and Sunday.

Vanessa produces punishing run

The first track event of the 2017 Western Australian State Championships was held at the ECAC track, Cannington on Thursday evening, March 30. Conditions were excellent with a coolish breeze helping to keep the temperature down, enabling the athletes to concentrate on the task at hand.

The fastest overall woman, Vanessa Carson (W35), garnered widespread praise for her stylish 39:06.9 run from spectators and competitors alike. She continues to compile an enviable record across a variety of distances this season, running the 10km as part of her build up for the 2017 Perth marathon. Vanessa used her burgeoning pace judgement skills to hit her split times consistently and easily go sub 40 minutes. Her three children were vocal in their enthusiastic support and at times ventured into 'acapella' territory with their chants. Notably, her partner, Andrew, was her lap-scorer and her mother was the children's choirmaster.

Claire Wardle (W40) showed the benefits of regular track racing at Tuesday evenings at WAAS with a controlled performance and displayed great pace



judgement and form throughout, she added a kick finish to record 41:30.2 - 24seconds quicker than last year. Trisha Farr ran 46 seconds quicker than last year and took out the W45 title in 45:50.5 with a sustained effort over the second half of the race; in particular, especially given she had to negotiate slower runners. The winner of the W50 crown was multiathlete Kerin Thomson, who limited her

focus to track racing for the evening chalking up a solid 46:27.1. Sue Bourn achieved her aim of a sub-fifty minute run, recording 49:38.6 for the silver medal. Sadly, Sue has been beset by injury over the last year and although her 'Bootcamp' training has kept her strong, her running fitness has suffered. Her time was the result of intestinal fortitude rather than fitness. More comfortable over even longer distances was bronze medallist, Claire Walkley. The multiple Comrades Marathon finisher produced a sterling performance of 50:56.1 after 'backing off' when she realised a sub-fifty minute time was not 'on'. Judy Davis (W50) continued her athletic journey on the track, after a recent foray into duathlons, with a 63:05.7 race. Her grit and determination were evident from the outset and the race should give her further confidence. The vastly experienced marathoner, Liz Neville (W65) 50:50.7 gave an honest account of her fitness level with a very comfortable looking run, belying the effort she put in. Gillian Young earned her silver medal with a time of 53:40.5 despite a limited build up, to set her up nicely for the upcoming titles.



Played out concurrently, the men's event was no less short on quality performances despite missing luminaries such as David Carr, Bruce Wilson, Lachlan Marr, Bjorn Dybdahl and Chris Maher, for a variety of reasons. Adrian Fabiankovits won the M30 division unchallenged and ran a 41:50.4 race off uniform laps. Rob Nichols (M35) was aggressive and assertive from gun-to-tape with an all-theway-win in an impressive time of 35:22.5.

Negotiating his way safely through the field, he remained focused and determined for the entire distance. The steeplechase specialist and medallist from Perth 2016, conserved nothing for next week's event as he systematically ticked off the laps. Chris Lark finished second in a competitive time of 36:35.1. Kim Thomas won the M40 gold medal after tracking Nichols the entire distance, holding the initial kilometre gap for the entire race and finishing a mere 22 seconds behind in 35:44.1. Kim won the title in 2016 running 36:26.1 indicating his marathon training is benefitting all his running. Steve Weller achieved consecutive silver medals running .3 slower than his time of last year with 36:57.7, but had many pundits wishing to see him using his undoubted speed over shorter distances. Bryant Burman scored the bronze medal



in a fine 38:42.4. Michihito 'Mickey' Muroi (M55) exhibited all the hallmarks of the top class marathoner he is, with his steely will steering him to a 43:39.6 finish. With well over 100 marathons to his credit, Mickey still approaches each race respectfully, no matter the distance. Mark Dawson took 45:08.0 to win the silver medal with lingering symptoms of a recent 'flu seemingly ignored. Paul Scott-Taylor produced a stellar 45:59.0 run. Brian Hewitt (M60) put together a confident race returning a time of 47:43.6 for the win. A versatile athlete from 400m upwards.

State Champion for 2017 in the M65 division was the multi-talented Giovanni Puglisi in 42:34.7. Always an aggressive participant, Giovanni is able to cover the ground with an efficient stride, imperceptibly changing it to unleash a ferocious kick when the need arises. Keith Miller positioned himself in silver medal contention from the early few kilometres to run 46:33.7 transferring his Sunday run background to the track better than most. Frank Price dug deep into the reservoirs to complete the journey in 71:03.0 and he earned a much-valued bronze medal. A breach of IAAF Rule 163.6 meant Brian Bennet was disgualified as he had left the track during the competition and reentered the race.

Maurice Creagh (M70) quietly went about his 'business' and was content to let the field 'carry him' along to record 57:15.2. It was not without effort as he was seen afterwards looking slightly the worse for wear but suitably pleased with his performance. Bob Schickert (M75) shrugged off the effects of jetlag and recent multiple races in Daegu for the World Masters Indoor Championships, to win the gold medal in 57:51.2 ahead of Morland Smith, who was justifiably proud having easily cracked the hour mark with his 59:04.4 time.

Pentathlon



Only eight male athletes fronted up to the pentathlon with a surfeit of withdrawals decimating the competition. Paul Jeffrey brings an exceptionally diverse skill set to any competition. Unchallenged by opponents he was after his state record but was thwarted by two mediocre (for him) throwing events. He never got 'on' to a big discus or javelin throw despite scoring 634 points and 748 points respectively. He launched himself into the final event, the 1500m with hopes of a 4:45 clocking but succumbed to a combination of an early quick pace, fatigue and heat.

Still a brilliant performance of 3530 points it was short of the 3639 he was shooting for. His 23.9 200m was his highest scoring event with 804 points. Mark Elms won his first state medal as a fifty-year-old and made it a gold one. His 4.61m long jump gained him 514 points and he backed it up with a javelin throw of 32.05m and (433pts). A torn hamstring in his strongest discipline, the 200m put paid to any points, however, he showed great strength of character to continue with 401 points in the discus and laboured around the metric mile in less than 7 minutes for a total of 1624 points.

Des Walsh (M60) cuts a slim figure but good technique enabled him to score remarkably well in the throwing events on his way to his maiden pentathlon title with a 2021 total. A more controlled effort in the 1500m will bring a higher score as his 30.2 (592pts).

Rob Antoniolli amassed a super total of 2712 points with a massive 5:43.5 1500m

time gaining 821 points alone. The M65 athlete is an experienced campaigner and showed all his wiles to win the coverted crown. Harold Membrey showed a great turn of speed in the 200m to run 32.7 (509pts) and gained 463pts as a reward for staying the distance in the 1500m. Nick Miletic lost no friends with his bronze medal performance. Nominally a runner, he had the highest totals in his age group for both throws. With a largely "agricultural" technique relying on brute strength rather than a honed technique a minimal amount of coaching would make him a threat at higher levels of competition. Another Bunbury domicile, Leon Sander (M80) gained over half his points in the two running events. A world class 200m of 34.6 (768pts) and a 1500m of 7:38.5 (735pts) contributed heavily towards his exceptional final score of 2875 points.

Geoff soars to title

2017 WAMA state The championships opened in late March at WAAS with the pole vault. Reflecting the vagaries of the event competitors, Geoff the two Brayshaw (M65) and Phil Smyth (M70) met with opposite results. Fierce rivals in the field of play Geoff was able to record 2.55m to win his age group while Phil was unable to clear a height despite recent heights of more than 2.60m,

Annmarie celebrates return to athletics

In the women's pentathlon, Annmarie O'Donovan, by her own admission, overcame relatively poor throwing, to be crowned W45 State Champion for 2017. Her successful comeback to athletics was sparked by Perth 2016 where she competed in the heptathlon and won a silver medal in the 400 hurdles. A 14.9 100m (569pts) provided the platform for a 2053 points tally. A controlled 800m bolstered her points well over 2000 and recorded a 2:57.0 effort. Donna Abbey took the silver courtesy of a classy long jump (4.13m) valued at 448pts.

Sue Coate (W50) opening strongly in the first two events with a 100m of 15.1 (708pts) and shot put of 10.02m (703pts) looked to have the title sewn up early. Her 800m only needed to be within touch of Juliana Kelly and this she did without overextending herself in the hot sun, running 3:37.5. No less impressive was Juliana, making her debut in the pentathlon. She revealed a throwing arm as she sent the spear out to 16.01m (308pts) to add to her 15.5 100m (650pts). A gutsy 800m, where she sat and kicked strongly brought her 454 points (3:16.2).

The competitive women's 60-64 event saw jumper Gay Wyatt, distance runner Carol Bowman and 'Jill of most trades', Julie Wilson, battle for supremacy. Carol surprised all, including herself, with a slick 100m (17.8) for 530 pts. Gay was 18.2 for 482pts and Julie 19.4 (352 pts).



Gay was able to edge Carol out in most disciplines, leaving Carol heading out in the two-lapper knowing only a big run would see her grab the title. A kick with 200m to go ensured her a fast time of 3:18.1 but back in the field the competitive juices of Gay were stirred and she unleashed a strong kick of her own to substantially pick up the pace and run 3:33.0. Looking every inch the middle distance athlete, with her long elegant stride and competitive instinct, the effort gave her 493pts, her highest scoring event of the five and enough for victory in a new state record. Julie finished the event with a 3:54.8 off very little training and no speed work. She has been beset by injury and enjoyed travel in the last few years, but showed enough to suggest a return to form is imminent.

Maureen Keshwar has extended her repertoire of events recently with a steeplechase, but put herself way out of her comfort zone with a pentathlon. A new state record despite a self-confessed botched horizontal jump of best of 2.39m (244pts) was balanced by excellent throws and a sterling 3:52.9 (453pts) 800m. Reluctant to run further than one lap even to warm up until recently, Maureen's effort was worthy of merit. An excellent 100 16.0 (864pts) was the highest of the day and her throws were a feature of her competition. Should she invest more time into the pentathlon there is a wealth of talent to explore.

Brenda Painter made the trip up from her home to complete a fine pentathlon. Her Perth 2016 heptathlon served her well with no nerves to hamper her here. Her new state record of 1856 points was accrued over just four events with her lack of aerobic capacity-robbing her of an 800m score. Possessed of great speed -100m 18.9 (607pts) and her long jump of 2.39m (317pts) a modicum of coaching will lift her remaining events.

Bunbury's outstanding Ruth Johnson ran the highest scored 100m of the day – her 18.2 gaining a hefty 831 points. With her 3:57.4 800m (774pts) tail ending a superb competition resulting in a total of 2940 points; a state title, a state record.

2017 State Athletics Championships Throws Pentathlon



Bunbury domicile, John Fettus (M40) collected 651 points from his highest scoring discipline, the weight throw of 12.51m. His total of 2756 points was slightly down on his fourth place at Perth 2016 where he scored 2954 points.

Peter Tua (M45) best disciplines were shot put - 7.73m (443pts) and discus 24.03 (444pts). He was able to accumulate a 1776 total.

The M50 division was dominated by Todd Davey with a massive points score of 3856. Davey's discus earned him 913 points (50.93m) with a 16.35m (858pts) weight throw. His shot put of 13.32m gained him 827 points. Tim Lyons had the edge on Thomas Murrell. His 37.36m discus earning him 627 points with Thomas's best event the weight throw where he gained 605 points. Lyons filled second position with a personal best total of 2720 with Murrell on 2264.

Andrew Ward won the M55 title with 2498 points. His highest scoring discipline was the shot where his 8.99m gave him 571 points.

Jo Peters' 15.98m weight throw was worth a tremendous 830 points. Together with a PB in the javelin of 32.99m (539pts), one of the highest scoring javelin throws of the whole competition, bolstered his points total to 3415.

Ossi Igel (M65) accrued the second highest total of the day, 3648 points. He


scored over 800 points in three disciplines. His shot of 12.03m (873pts), discus of 42.10m (849pts) and weight throw of 14.57m (806pts). Notably, Ossi's javelin throw of 31.93m was the highest scoring of the competition at 587 points.

Rob Young (M70) scored 470 points for his shot effort, measured at 7.61m and gained a total 1604 points over the course of the competition.

Evergreen, Jim Davis outscored Bob Fergie for the title in the M80 age group with a total of 3166 points. Jim's hammer of 29.85m, worth 771 points was his highest scoring discipline. Bob's total of 2798 points resulted from a consistent series of throws.



The 2016 Perth bronze medallist, State record holder, National title holder and AMA nominee, backed up superbly from last week's 10km event.


The M45 winner Wayne Bertram was forced to reduce his pace after a very fast start covered the distance in 16:46.1. In the M50 division, Alan Gray debuted over the 3km event. An impressive set of consistent lap splits contributed to a fine time of 14:48.7.

Giovanni Puglisi (M65) ran a very strong race to post an 8:43.4 slower than his silver medal performance at Perth 2016. A clean sweep of all his events looks to be on the cards again this year barring incident or accident. Bruce Wilson (M70) had every reason to be pleased with his strikingly consistent lap times. Also a world master's medallist, Bruce adds quality to any event he competes in. Bob Schickert (M75) no stranger to the event, remained in his purple patch of form and recorded a very smart time of 11:42.0 for his title. David Carr (M80) approached the event with his 'game face' on. Looking very determined he was quite smooth over the steeples engaging an effective, wellpracticed technique which has served him well. The current world record holder, no less, he ran a 10:57.6 further enhancing his respect in the running community. David is on the cusp of moving into the M85 division where the present world record is 11:36.93.

The gold and silver medallists from Perth 2016 replicated their positions at state level. Irwin Barrett-Lennard (M85) laid claims to the title early on with a very strong start with his characteristic high knee-lift helping him to victory in 13:26.5. In second place Cecil Walkley received thunderous applause for his run. Despite illness and injury, Cecil has been a fixture on both tracks throughout the season.









In the women's event held over the 2km distance, Vanessa Carson (W35) added to her 10km title with a dominant display of front running. Looking focused and confident despite a basic hurdling technique, she was able to negotiate the barriers without mishap or 'having a swim' as she quipped afterwards. Her time of 7:50.4 was significantly under the state record (9:15.9) but cannot be recognised as several of the steeples have deteriorated to the point they no longer reach the required height for record purposes. Sue Zlnay (W55) ventured over the barriers using her undoubted strength and fitness to record another world class time of 9:04.4 and employed her signature 'kick' to good effect. Winner of the W50 division, Simone Solomon, showed her Perth 2016 bronze medal in the same event was no fluke as she emphasised her 'chase'

credentials with a time of 9:39.0. Julie Wilson (W60), a former state record holder in this event, showed her experience to chalk up a time of 11:24.8 despite being slightly down on fitness at present. Gillian Young (W65) also backed up from the state 10km to be untroubled by either the barriers or the distance to run 10:40.2. The silver medallist from Perth 2016 ran a time within two seconds of that performance. Lynne Schickert (W75) added another gold medal to her collection by completing the run in 17:13.8 using her trademark steely will and perseverance in equal measure.
